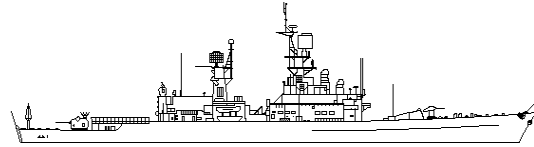

PARTICIPATE

From the Secretary. This fine group has grown to about 900 located shipmates. There are potentially 3000 unfound members. We need the help of each of you to contact all of these. The following information is taken from “*Robert’s Rules of Order Newly Revised*” 10th edition. Chapter XV section 47 **Officers** Pages 431 – 451.

President: There are many entries for the parliamentary duties of the President. I will try to limit the list to those that I believe apply to our size and structure.

1. Open the meeting at the appointed time.
2. Announce the proper sequence of business before the assembly in accordance with the prescribed order of business, agenda, or program, and with the existing orders of the day.
3. Recognize members who are entitled to the floor.
4. To state and to put to vote all questions that legitimately come before the assembly as motions or that otherwise arise in the course of proceedings.
5. To protect the assembly from obviously frivolous or dilatory motions by refusing to recognize them.
6. To enforce the rules of debate.
7. To expedite business in every way compatible with the rights of members.
8. To decide all questions of order, subject to appeal.
9. To respond to inquiries of parliamentary procedure or factual information bearing on the business of the assembly.
10. To authenticate by his signature, all acts, orders, and proceedings of the assembly.
11. To declare the meeting adjourned when the assembly so votes or – where applicable – at the time prescribed in the program, or at any time in the event of sudden emergency affecting the safety of those present.

Also noted were the papers the president should have at hand for the meeting.

- A copy of the bylaws and other rules of the organization.
- A copy of its parliamentary authority (for example the Robert’s Rules of Order is so prescribed in the bylaws.)
- A list of all standing and special committees and their members.
- A memorandum of the complete order of business listing all known matters that are to come up.
- Any other papers that are necessary to the meetings agenda.

As noted by the lists above the overall duties of the president are primarily the orderly conduct of the meeting. The President may be charged with other administrative duties for the organization or group, but the scope of the “*Robert’s Rules of Order Newly Revised*” do not cover these type of duties. They may be prescribed by the assembly or spelled out in the associations Bylaws.

Vice President: The vice president exists primarily to take over for the President in his absence. This includes anything from a few minutes to permanently replacing should the situation require. An organization may have as many vice presidents, as it desires. If there is more than one, they should be numbered in order of precedence. The Vice President may have other Administrative duties as desired by the association. These are usually spelled out in the Bylaws.

Secretary: The secretary is the recording officer of the assembly and the custodian of its records, except those specifically assigned to others such as the treasurer’s books. Duties include:

1. To keep a record of all the proceeding of the organization – usually called the minutes.
2. To keep on file all committee reports.
3. To keep the organizations official membership roll – unless this duty is assigned to another individual such as a membership officer.
4. To make the minutes and records available to members upon request.

5. To notify officers, committee members, and delegates of their election or appointment, to furnish committees with whatever documents required for the performance of their duties, and to hand each meeting a list of all existing committees and members.
6. To sign all certified copies of acts of the society, unless specified in the bylaws.
7. To maintain record books in which the bylaws, special rules of order, standing rules, and minutes are entered, with any amendments to these documents properly recorded, and to have the current record books on hand at every meeting.
8. To send out to the membership a notice of each meeting, known as a call of the meeting, and to conduct the general correspondence of the organization – that is not a function of another officer.
9. To prepare prior to each meeting an order of business for the use of the presiding officer, showing I their exact order, under the correct headings, all matters known in advance that are due to come up and the times for which they are set.
10. In the absence of the president and vice president the secretary may call the meeting to order and immediately initiate the election of a president or *chairman pro tem*.

When reports are received the Secretary should note the date and time on the first page that he received them, then file them in the appropriate place.

Treasurer: The treasurer of the organization is the officer entrusted with the custody of its funds. This officer cannot disburse funds except as specified by the society or the Bylaws. The treasurer is required to make a full financial report annually or as prescribed in the bylaws, and may make such interim reports as required by the assembly or executive board. This person will provide a statement of all monies that the Association has upon turnover. The Treasure will sign this statement, and pass it on to the Association’s Secretary for accountability.

Master-at-arms: On the floor of the meeting hall assists the chair in the preservation of order. In meetings where only members or some other limited category of persons are permitted, controls entry to the meeting hall.

Appointed volunteers:

Historian: Prepares a narrative account of the society’s activities during his term of office, which when approved by the assembly will become a permanent part of the society’s official history. Maintain the documents and archives of history related to USS Wainwright and the Association of her shipmates.

Curator: Serves as custodian of any objects of value that may belong to the society. This person is also accountable for the artifacts that were removed from the USS Wainwright DLG/CG-28, and artifacts from the US Naval Archives Center. These items are on loan from the US Navy, and are subject to annual inspections, site visits, and inventory. This person is responsible for the preservation and well being of all these artifacts. This person will sign an inventory list of the artifacts, and will be kept by the Association’s Secretary. In the event that the Association’s Curator is not performing his duties, the Association will acquire all artifacts and appoint another curator. If the curator is deceased the US Naval Archives Center will be contacted, and the proper information submitted to allow the Association to retain artifacts on loan. Both re appointment or the death of the curator the Association has to notify the proper authorities at the US Naval Archives Center within 30 days.

Chaplin: Leads Invocations an benedictions where such prayers are offered at the opening and closing of meetings or events. Not required to be a clergyman, unless otherwise specified in the organizations bylaws.
